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Goal of the discipline	The goal of the discipline is to provide physicians with the necessary level of theoretical knowledge and practical skills for the proper performance of the duties when performing investigative actions, in case of being involved in the commission of experts; to form lawful behavior of future specialists when performing professional activities.
Tasks of the discipline	<p>- formation of knowledge about:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • legal regulation of the organization of forensic medical examination, basic principles of work of state forensic institutions; • principles and methods of expert diagnostics and assessment of the course of pathological processes in case of mechanical injuries and other external influences; • criteria and procedure for establishing the death of a person; • signs of biological death of a person; • responsibility and professional misconduct of a doctor; <p>- formation of skills in:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • examining a corpse at the scene of an incident; • identifying signs of biological death of a person; • drawing up a protocol for establishing a person's death and other documentation in connection with a person's death; • evaluating the results of the examination of the corpse, presence, nature, severity of early and late cadaveric changes; • using knowledge of forensic medicine to assist law enforcement agencies in the investigation and judicial review of criminal, civil, administrative cases as a medical expert; <p>- formation of skills in forensic medical research (examination), interpretation of the results of forensic laboratory research, construction of the final (forensic) diagnosis, execution of the necessary documents.</p>
